#### Illness Reminders

If your child gets sick, it is often most appropriate to keep him/her home from school. A child who is sick will not be able to perform well in school and is likely to spread the illness to other children and staff.

Please keep your child at home if he/she has:

- 1. Fever in the past 24 hours 100 degrees or higher (must be fever free for 24 hours)
- 2. Vomiting in the past 24 hours
- 3. Diarrhea in the past 24 hours
- 4. Strep throat (must have been taking an antibiotic for at least 24 hours before returning to school)
- 5. Bad cold, with a very running nose or bad cough, especially if it has keep the child awake at night.
- 6. Head lice live bugs or nits (lice eggs)
- 7. Rash with fever
- 8. Pinkeye (must be on antibiotic eye drops for 24 hours, which includes 4 doses, before returning to school)

If your child becomes ill at school and is too sick to benefit from school or is contagious to other children, you will be called to take him/her home. Please ensure we have current phone numbers to reach you should we need to contact you during the day and an emergency number in the event you cannot be reached. It is essential that your child not return to school until he/she is fever free for 24 hours.
